hen Will Rogers was eight years old, he was sent away to school at Harrell International Institute in Muskogee for fourth grade. Late in the year, he became homesick

and briefly returned home to the family ranch near Oologah, sick with the mumps.

Will Rogers started school at Drumgoole, an Indian school near Chelsea. The tuition was a \$1.00 per month, and most students were full-blood Cherokee. English was their second language. Following Harrell and the death of his mother, Mary America Schrimsher, he enrolled at Willie Halsell Institute at Vinita, then Scarritt College at Neosho, Missouri, and completed his formal education at Kemper Academy, a military school in Boonville, Missouri.

As an adult, Will Rogers said he learned in two ways: "one is reading. The other is association with smarter people." Will read several newspapers every day for most of his life. As a child at home, his mother taught him to read. He never stopped reading.

WILL ROGERS MEMORIAL MUSEUM Guide for LEARNING HUNT

West Gallery and Charles Banks Wilson Introduction:

Will Rogers was the most popular entertainer in America. He was #1 in stage, newspapers, radio, movies and as an events speaker. He traveled the world and met dignitaries, but never lost touch with the common man. He treated everyone he met as a friend and was considered a friend in turn. In this gallery are some of Will's saddles and paintings by artists dedicated to helping remember Will Rogers.

Heritage Gallery Introduction:

Will was born into a family that was steeped in Native American history. His father's side of the family came over before the Trail of Tears and his father was on the Cherokee Tribal Council. Will's dad fought for the Confederacy during the Civil War and later served at the Constitutional Convention that created the state of Oklahoma. His parents met at school in Tahlequah. Will grew up on the ranch and he always wanted to be a cowboy. Through his heritage, family and friends, he learned how to respect others and he learned a special skill that would help him in the future, roping.

Rotunda, Radio Gallery, Mini Theater and Study Introduction:

The Rotunda is the focal point of the Memorial. The statue was created by Jo Davidson and there is a replica in Statuary Hall in Washington D.C, facing the entry into the House of Representatives. It is said the Presidents rub Will's foot for good luck before they give the State of the Union address. The glass doors were the original entrance to the Memorial and thousands of people a day would come to pay their respects to Will. The Sunken Garden below was started in 1941 and completed in 1942. 1944 is the year Will's body was brought from California and laid to rest here. The radio gallery touches on Will's experience in radio. His show would air on Sunday nights causing some churches had to change their meeting time so the congregation wouldn't skip church to hear Will talk. The Mini Theater shows some of Will's "talkie" movies and the study is a replica of his study at his ranch in California.

South Gallery Introduction:

Will Rogers dominated the media of his day; stage, newspaper, radio and movies. Beloved by millions, he came to know some of the most famous people in the world. He started in Wild West shows doing his trick roping and later added commentary on the news of the day. His shows became more and more popular, which led to greater opportunities. His newspaper column ran in 600 papers. He started a weekly article in 1922, then added a daily column in 1926 and continued both until the day he died. He was in 71 movies, 50 of which were silent. He was the #1 movie star in 1934 and the #1 male movie star in 1935, only surpassed by a young Shirley Temple. The mural on the wall was dedicated in 1966.

Vista, Diorama, East Hall and Final Journey Introduction:

This wing of the Memorial was built in 1982. There were office spaces down the hall and the diorama room was built in 2012. This property, with a beautiful view overlooking Claremore was purchased by Will and Betty in 1911 for them to build a home to retire. After Will's death, Betty gave the land to the State of Oklahoma for the Memorial to be built. There were several renditions before the final design was chosen. The Oklahoma Legislature created the Will Rogers Memorial Commission, a state agency, and built the Memorial in about 9 months. It opened on Will's birthday, November 4th. The Final Journey exhibit details the last week of Will's life.
